The Stone Soup Leadership Institute is a global leader in developing climate education and sustainable workforce development educational tools, trainings, and initiatives for the transition to a sustainable economy. For over 25 years, we have worked with business, government, education and community leaders to develop strategic initiatives, public-private partnerships and build sustainable communities -- from New England to Hawaii; from inner cities of Boston, Oakland, Cincinnati; from the islands of Vieques, Puerto Rico, to the British Virgin Islands and the Philippines.

As the climate crisis rages around the world, it challenges each of us to do whatever we can to help our children, our communities, and the planet. Scientists, universities, nonprofits, NGOs, as well as concerned parents, and youth environmental leaders are all working tirelessly to spread an urgent message: the next generation deserves the best educational tools to prepare them for their future.

Young people are hungering for solutions to the climate crisis –they are eager to learn how they can help, and they want to know how they can pursue jobs in a green economy. Business leaders of sustainability-oriented companies need a trained sustainable workforce. Educational institutions are eager to train them. The greatest challenge they find is that high school educators – as well as guidance counselors – need to expand their knowledge of the wide diversity of sustainable career pathways that will lead to good paying jobs and will help local communities transition to a sustainable economy. Imagine what millions of new jobs in emerging green energy industries could mean for our communities and our world. It's up to each one of us to respond and take action NOW.

➤ **The Cronkite Awards for Climate Education: April 2023**

The Cronkite Awards for Climate Education was an official hybrid event with **Earth Week** held in Connecticut, Hawaii, Massachusetts and New Jersey. We honored these leaders who have led visionary legislation to integrate climate education into their state's schools. They represent a model for future collaboration; with the Award we highlighted their leadership and built bridges to push this important agenda forward. Widely recognized as "the most trusted man in America," Walter Cronkite believed that journalism was a higher calling. Over 50 years ago he boldly covered the first Earth Day with the same passion he had for covering the moon landing, rallying more than 20 million Americans to join the emerging green movement. Mr. Cronkite served as The Institute's honorary chairperson for over a decade. It is his wisdom, leadership, and vision of preparing youth as future leaders that inspired the Institute's [Cronkite Awards](#).

➤ **Green Job Shadow Day: February-March 2023**

The Institute launched its first Green Job Shadow Day and its Sustainable Career Mentor Initiative, a disruptive model designed to fast-track this emerging industry by connecting sustainability-oriented professionals as virtual mentors with young people in marginalized communities so they can pursue green jobs. This model will catalyze a regionally focused sustainable workforce development pipeline.

➤ **The Institute's 19th Global Sustainability Summit: June 2023**

In June 2023, the Institute held its 19th Global Sustainability Summit with keynote remarks by State Senate Marc Pacheco "The work that this Institute is doing, to expose young people from throughout the world, to both the crisis and the opportunity that exists to change things, in a powerful way, is truly extraordinary." This week-long intensive leadership program empowers students to envision personal, professional, community and planetary goals – provided this year's youth delegations from Massachusetts and Terceira, Azores intensive training on how to build a sustainable world. Students explored sustainable workforce development opportunities and developed their Sustainable Career Pathways on the Institute's SustainWDN™ portal so they can pursue meaningful good-paying jobs, while helping to rebuild our planet. ➤ **The Institute's 2023 Progress Report on The State of Climate Education in U.S. & Europe: June 2023**

In the U.S., New Jersey and Connecticut are the first states to have passed legislation for climate education mandates. Starting this fall, public schools in these states are now required to teach climate education. While that's a good start, European and Asian countries are light years ahead of the US when it comes to climate education. In 2015, 178 member countries pledged to use the UN's 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) as a benchmark to focus their initiatives and measure their progress toward improving health and education, reducing inequality, and spurring economic growth-while also tackling the challenges of climate change and working to preserve and protect our oceans and forests. Yet even in those countries, the challenge is monumental: in a survey of 36 European countries most respondents reported that the responsibility of climate education lies with schools, and 70 % stated that the current school curriculum doesn't address climate education. When teachers were asked why they weren't farther along with implementing their climate education goals, 66 % said that training is lacking, and 51% cited a lack of climate education resources. The Martha's Vineyard Commission conducted an extensive 5-year community-wide planning process to determine the Island's needs and develop a vision for its future. Unfortunately, the comprehensive Island Plan didn't include young people. Martha's Vineyard youth were trained by Vieques youth leaders to develop their **2020 Sustainable Vision Reports: Challenging Leaders to Create Sustainable Policies**.

MVYLI youth leaders worked for one year to research, understand this plan and then worked with the MV Commission's top cartographer to create a Sustainable Vineyard Map as a visible way to share their vision for how to create a sustainable Martha's Vineyard for future generations. During the Institute's Sustainability Summits and year-round youth-community leadership initiatives, these young people developed the skills, training, and experience they need to speak truth to power, and to challenge their leaders to create policies for adapting to climate change realities. They have represented their island communities at state, national, and global events like U.S. Secretary Kerry's Ocean Summit, along with leaders like Dr. Sylvia Earle, Leonardo DiCaprio, and Monaco's Prince Albert. In 2014, youth leaders presented the report to the Island's seasonal residents at The Institute's Walter Cronkite Awards.

➤ **Hawaii: Support Governor Ige's Vision of 100% Renewable Energy by 2045**

When he was just 16 years old, Trevor Tanaka secured champions in Hawaii's House of Representatives and Senate, made presentations, solicited testimonials from community leaders—and in just six months got his Sustainability Resolution passed in both houses of government. During the following nine years, he's been working on getting it implemented. Through this process, he—and all of our youth leaders—have learned a lot. We call this Policy-In- Action. It started with President Obama's speech at the 2011 APEC Summit in Honolulu, and led to the Institute's Sustainability Forums with youth, business, community, and government leaders and the Hawaii Department of Education. There, Trevor proudly presented a report on strategic recommendations from the Hawaii Governor's Report on Climate Preparedness Resiliency to President Obama. Then secured a grant from Hawaii's Department of Tourism, Business, and Economic Development to create an online system, the Sustainable Hawaii Toolkit. All this was to ensure that all of Hawaii's young people would learn about sustainability in school. Trevor achieved this by standing on the shoulders of youth leaders from Puerto Rico and Martha's Vineyard, who had championed Policy-In- Action projects.

➤ **Puerto Rico: Support Governor to Implement Healthy Communities Model**

Puerto Rico's Governor Sila Calderon was an ardent supporter of the Healthy Communities movement. She was pleased to learn that The Institute's founding director was one of its co-founders in the early 90's. She was intrigued that the book and curriculum, *Stone Soup for the World: Life-Changing Stories of Everyday Heroes (Pan Y Vino Para El Camino* in Spanish) integrates the principles of healthy communities. She was impressed that there were ten Latin heroes in the book to showcase how people from Latin countries were re/building their communities. She invited The Institute to use this bi-lingual curriculum to realize her goal of empowering local communities to work together to address social, economic inequities in Puerto Rico. The Institute developed the Vieques Youth Leadership Initiative as a showcase for the Healthy Communities model.

➤ **2020 Sustainable Vision Reports: Challenging Our Leaders to Create Sustainable Policies**

As part of The Institute's youth leadership initiatives, we invite youth leaders to envision a sustainable future for their communities. Youth leaders from these communities created a 2020 Report for Sustainable Development, challenging their leaders to develop policies that protect their communities' fragile ecosystems, provide for their families, create opportunities for their children, and build a just, equitable, and sustainable future. Through our annual Sustainability Summits, Career Mentor & Job Shadow Day Program, College Prep & Community Service Programs and year-round youth community leadership initiatives we've inspired multicultural young people to become effective leaders of a more just, equitable and sustainable world. Through an intensive four-year visioning and community engagement process, participating youth prepared well-researched, well- documented presentations that challenged their leaders to develop policies that balance protecting their communities' fragile ecosystems, providing for their families, creating opportunities for their children, and building a prosperous future. They attracted like-minded people to join them in preserving their communities by attracting philanthropists, socially responsible investors, and venture capitalists to help them develop green projects. The report was presented to the Governor and the Mayor of Vieques, who gifted 300 acres to build a green community for landless families.

The Institute organized an Economic Development Mission with Vieques Mayor and his Economic Development Council to the British Virgin Islands (BVI) to study sustainable island economic models. There Vieques youth presented their 2020 Sustainable Vision Report. The BVI Prime Minister was so impressed with their presentation he asked the Institute to develop the Virgin Gorda Youth Leadership Initiative.

Soon after the People Power movement in 1986, The Institute's founding director began a 30-year relationship with the Philippines. For the first assignment, she worked with President Cory Aquino's Ministry of Trade & Economic Development to develop a multi-national campaign to engage companies and individuals to support the new government. The theme of *Bayanihan* built on their cultural theme of inspiring people to work together for the good of their country. The inspiring story of People Power is a powerful story in the book, *Stone Soup for the World: Life-Changing Stories of Everyday Heroes*. The story spotlights the pioneering work of Marietta Primicias Goco who was a champion for women rights and economic development. In 2003 Mrs. Goco traveled from the Philippines to New York City to receive The Institute's Eleanor Roosevelt Award at a prestigious event attended by Walter Cronkite, Dr. Muhammad Yunus, and other dignitaries. That same year, the Franklin & Eleanor Roosevelt Institute sponsored a fact-finding mission on how Mrs. Goco embodied Eleanor Roosevelt as a champion for women's rights with microcredit/microfinance programs. She spearheaded the Social Reform Act, the first legislation of its kind in the country, and then served as the President's Commission to Fight Poverty, the first such commission in the world.

Thanks to the global press Mrs. Goco received from the Eleanor Roosevelt Award, she experienced a newly-achieved celebrity status, which she used to champion the arduous process of changing the Constitution of the Philippines. One of the significant outcomes of this historic initiative was that previously marginalized indigenous fisherfolk could now be equally represented, and her country could have a more equitable economy. The resulting microcredit/microfinance programs for indigenous fisherfolk have had a far-reaching effect on this vulnerable island nation, leading to a reduction in the exploitive and destructive practices of detonating the seas to catch precious endangered fish for Chinese "delicacies." The 22-year-old Mitzi Jonelle Tan, who stands with and amplifies the voices of indigenous fisherfolk in the Philippines, is featured in the new book, *Stone Soup for a Sustainable World: Life-Changing Stories of Young Heroes*.

The Institute's tools have been used by educators from the islands of Martha's Vineyard to Vieques, Puerto Rico, Hawaii, Philippines, Sri Lanka and British Virgin Islands to inner cities of Baltimore, Boston, Cincinnati, Holyoke, Fall River, New Bedford and Oakland. The Institute's Curriculum *Stone Soup for the World: Life-Changing Stories of Everyday Heroes* has been used in 120 communities around the world to teach Diversity, Equity & Inclusion (DEI), Social Emotional Learning (SEL) and Service Learning. The Institute's [Stone Soup Climate Education Curriculum](#) features 100 Lesson Plans that bring to life the stories in the book, *Stone Soup for a Sustainable World: Life-Changing Stories of Young Heroes*. It is aligned with NGSS (Next Generation State Standards), California and Massachusetts state standards, and the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (UNSDG).

The Stone Soup EdTech Platform is a comprehensive library of dynamic educational tools for teachers to educate their students using our books, videos and curricula, *Stone Soup for a Sustainable World: Life-Changing Stories of Young Heroes*. We incorporate best practices and sustainability innovations from 38 countries. It is aligned with U.N. Sustainable Development Goals; NGIS and state standards that fulfill state mandates.

SustainWDN™ is a cutting-edge online platform that connects green companies with educators and guidance counselors to guide students towards sustainable career pathways. The SustainWDN™ Surveys collect data on green job projections so local communities can build a sustainable regional economy. This proprietary program takes climate and sustainability curriculum and pairs it with education on present and future sustainable career pathways, while connecting these communities with businesses and mentors to complete a full cycle professional development program. This community-based workforce development pipeline actively increases public private partnerships to help communities keep up with the burgeoning blue-green economy and the associated 10 million jobs that are going to be created in the next decade.
