On April 17, 1998 over 100 community heroes, storytellers, celebrities and dignitaries signed books and recruited new volunteers in 40 communities across the country. They read their heartwarming stories, autographed books, organized creative events and signed people up for service opportunities in their communities.

All proceeds from the book go to the Stone Soup Leadership Institute to help support educational projects that encourage children to help build a better world.
