


Stone Soup Leadership Institute's Story of the Week: Father Joe – Father Joe's Villages Week of July 7 - July 13



Sunday July 7: Story: Father Joe:


READ how Father Joe was a champion for the less fortunate and helped changed the way San Diego dealt with homelessness.

Father Joe's Villages (formerly St. Vincent de Paul Village) has become a national model for how to break the cycle of poverty by helping unhoused people regain their independence and dignity by giving back.

Born in the Bronx, Father Joe came to San Diego at age 22 with only \$50. In his lifetime he raised millions for the homeless.

His story is featured in Stone Soup for the World and in the Stone Soup Educational Curriculum.

Father Joe's Villages mission is to prevent and end homelessness, one life at a time with their creed: Compassion, Respect, Empathy, Empowerment, and Dignity.

Founded by Father Joe in 1950, it has grown to include a comprehensive campus and scattered-site programs that house over 2,000 people nightly. It all began with a small chapel in downtown San Diego.

Upon his retirement in 2011, Father Joe had overseen the growth of one of the most comprehensive homeless services agencies in the country. For decades, the organization has been a trusted name in San Diego.


Thursday: July 11: Institute Initiative Feature


Thursday: July 11: 2nd Post: Dorothy Day: Quote

EDUCATORS use this FREE Lesson plan to help your students learn how we can support those less fortunate in our communities with service learning projects.


Help your students learn about the values of having a vision, dedication, taking initiative, resourcefulness as well as increase their social emotional learning.
