
André Trocmé Chambon Foundation France Sunday August 4: Story: Andre Trocme

READ how André Trocme, a Protestant minister, and his wife, Magda, led his rural village of French Huguenots to hide Jewish refugees from the Nazis during World War II.

"Will you hide the Jews?" André had been asked. "Is your village prepared to do that?"

Their story is featured in Stone Soup for the World and in the Stone Soup Educational Curriculum.

Monday: August 5: Andre Trocme

Bravely facing Nazi threats and interrogation, the French community of Le Chambon-sur-Lignon made a collective decision to hide and protect Jewish people. They refused to identify their Jewish neighbors and instead created a haven for Jewish children and families to live safely in their village.

Led by André Trocme-not one refugee was turned in or turned away.

Over five thousand Jews found shelter in this little village – which doubled the size of their little village.

The town's story is featured in Stone Soup for the World and in the Stone Soup Educational Curriculum.


Wednesday: August 7: Honor Roll: Andre Trocme: Chambon Foundation

During World War II, the Huguenot mountain village of Le Chambon-sur-Lignon, France, sheltered 5,000 Jewsmany of them children- from the Nazis by 5,000 Christians.

Founded in 1982, the Chambon Foundation, named in honor of the village, seeks to explore and communicate the challenging lessons of hope intertwined with the Holocaust's unavoidable lessons of despair.

Emmy Award-winning documentary filmmaker Pierre Sauvage was born in 1944 to parents who found refuge in Le Chambon. He produced a film based on the town and founded the Chambon Foundation to share story of this unique conspiracy of goodness in Sauvage's awardwinning feature documentary Weapons of the Spirit.






Thursday: August 8: Life Is Beautiful: 1st Post

Life is Beautiful is a film about overcoming adversity in a light-hearted but dark setting during WWII in a Nazi concentration camp. An Italian comedydrama film directed by and starring Roberto Benigni whose father spent two years in concentration camps.

The film explores themes of protecting a child's innocence against backdrops of conflict, hopelessness and despair. It received widespread acclaim, with critics praising its story, performances and direction, and the union of drama and comedy. It received three Academy Awards, including Best Foreign Language Film and Best Actor for Benigni. The film hit U.S. theaters 26 years ago but it raises issues that are still relevant today.

Saturday: August 10: Press: Andre Trocme

President Barack Obama speech highlights the strength and courage to stand up against injustices in his speech about the villagers of Le Chambon, France:

"They teach us that no one can make us into bystanders without our consent, and that we are never truly alone – that if we have the courage to heed that "still, small voice" within us, we can form a minyan for righteousness that can span a village, even a nation.

Their legacy is our inheritance. And the question is, how do we honor and preserve it? How do we ensure that "never again" isn't an empty slogan, or merely an aspiration, but also a call to action? I believe we start by doing what we are doing today – by bearing witness, by fighting the silence that is evil's greatest co-conspirator."
