


Sunday June 2: Story: Destiny Hodges Washington, DC


Tuesday: June 4: Destiny Hodges Washington, DC: Hero Report

Wednesday: June 5: Honor Roll: Destiny Hodges Washington, DC

The Hip Hop Caucus' mission is to use the power of our cultural expression to empower communities who are first and worst impacted by injustice. Their vision is racial justice, healthy communities, and a healthy planet. They have pioneered the cultural narrative to expand its impact, shown up with direct relief and continued solidarity with communities being harmed by systemic injustices, and built non-partisan democracy by engaging voters year-round. They mobilized hundreds of thousands of young BIPOC voters across seven election cycles. They produced HOME (Heal Our Mother

Earth) – the first climate album to move over 60,000 people to action in support of the Clean Power Plan in 2014.

Thursday: June 6: Hip Hop Caucus & Rev. Yearwood: Institute Feature


