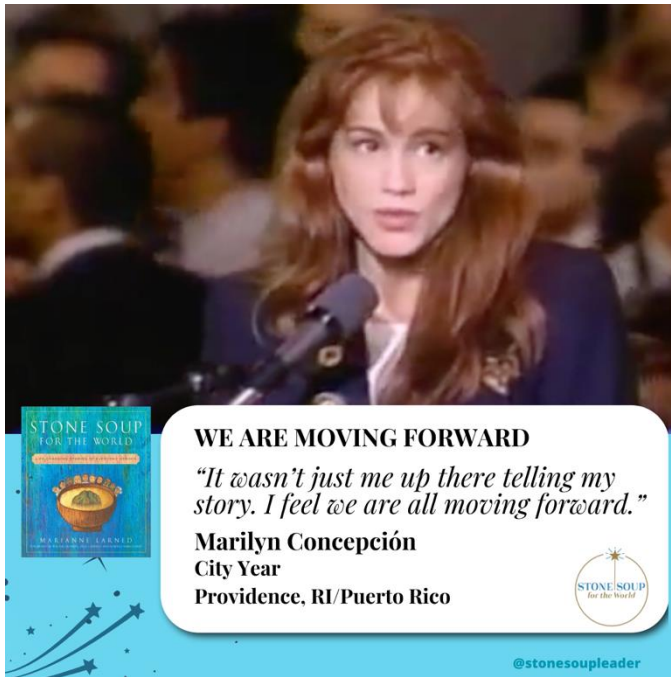

Marilyn Concepción's City Year experience helped change her life from that of a high-school dropout working dead-end jobs, to a Brown University student with a mission to serve her people. Marilyn now serves as Director of Latin Affairs for Representative Rosa DeLauro (CT).

Monday: August 19: Marilyn Concepción

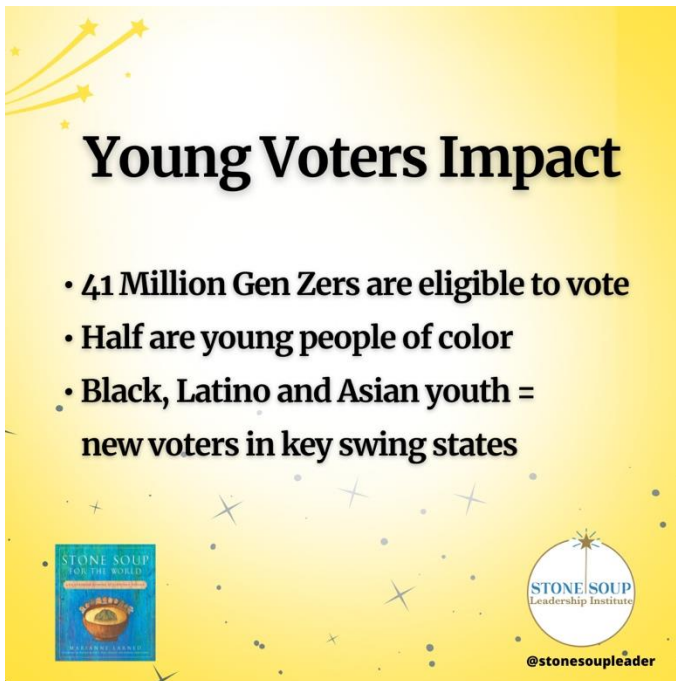
As a City Year Corps member, Marilyn got her GED, a degree equivalent to a high school diploma. She studied so hard that she passed in just one month, becoming the first person in her family to receive a high school diploma.

On that memorable day, she received a standing ovation from the entire City Year team. "I knew from then on that if I set my mind to something, I could accomplish it."

City Year was so impressed by Marilyn's enthusiasm, dedication, and sisterly leadership they chose her to start City Year in San Jose, California at the age of just 19!
