

Sunday July 21: Story: Arn Chorn-Pond



Arn Chorn-Pond has inspired many young people by sharing his story and his quest to find hope in his life.

Jacob Smith, a boy from Bedford-Stuyvesant, one of Brooklyn's toughest neighborhoods bonded with Arn over their shared trauma.

For several years Jacob had gone the way of guns, drugs, and violence and ended up in the juvenile justice system. "When I was acting out, I didn't have time to dream. But when I met Arn and began thinking again."

His story is featured in Stone Soup for the World and in the Stone Soup Educational Curriculum.

May 20, 2024: CMAA has been chosen as one of 150 local nonprofits to receive a share of \$30 million through the Cummings Foundation's annual grants program.




Wednesday: July 23: 2nd Post: Foundation Grant Announcement

Thursday: July 24: Maria Rodrigues: Institute Feature

Maria Rodriguez was one of thousands of Puerto Ricans who were environmental refugees after Hurricane Maria devastated their island home.

When she met Rev. Yearwood Jr. at U.S. Senator Whitehouse's Environmental Leaders conference, she was inspired by how he emphasized the importance of voting, especially young people to register to vote.

At this prestigious conference, Maria was sitting in the very front. She felt he was talking right to her. Maria decided right then and there that she was going to register to vote. A few weeks later, she did – so she now she can vote for people who will help her people and her homeland.

Arn Chorn-Pond: why the arts are as important as hospitals in Cambodia

Music saved Arn Chorn-Pond's life in a Khmer Rouge camp. Now, he is dedicated to reviving his country's cultural heritage.

Saturday: July 26: Press: Arn Chorn-Pond

When the ultra-communist Khmer Rouge regime seized Cambodia in 1975, 80-90% of the country's artists and musicians, including his parents, who ran an opera group were murdered. Since Arn was spared, he carries on their legacy.

Why is it so important to revive the arts? "Hospitals are important to heal people physically....restoring the arts restores identity, restores dignity. We can bring people together in harmony, in peace."
